



"The more I spoke to people of Sierra Leonean heritage, especially younger people, the more I realized what was missing in terms of our own education – about our country, about the history. I'm trying to give this cultural relevance back to those kids. To reinforce their knowledge of a path they might not have explored before."

He said in an interview.

Foday Dumbuya collaborated with global sportswear giant Adidas to design Arsenal's striking second kit for the upcoming the 2025/26 season, alongside their culture wear collection.

Fashion is a fundamental expression of culture; it is a mirror that reflects a society's values, traditions, and contemporary influences. With eyes on Africa, her fashion is even more







traditionally observed by South Africa's Xhosa ethnic group. As per the tradition, Ngxokolo and his fellow initiates were supposed to re-enter society with fresh clothes after their month away. "It was a British-style, gentleman type of look. So your typical look would be a hunter cap or a hat and a jacket,"... But Ngxokolo decided to fashion his own outfits from scratch, ones more reflective of Xhosa culture. An outlier among his fellow "amakrwala", as initiates are called. from boyhood emerged donning "an accent colour around the calf, around the neck, around the chest... and lots of stripes". personally Having

Xhosa-inspired high-end

clothing companies, Ngxokolo began to develop MaXhosa Africa - a designer brand dominated by knitwear and colourful Xhosa patterns." There is no doubt that African fashion is a dynamic fusion of tradition and innovation, constantly evolving yet deeply rooted in cultural heritage but it is recognizing the need to promote these cultures and actually promoting it that will preserve our heritage.

Some fashion houses are rediscovering their roots and incorporating traditional techniques into their modern collections, appealing to consumers seeking authenticity and craftsmanship

CULTURAL IDENTITY AND PRESERVATION OF TRADITIONAL VALUES.

According to the study of multiculturalism, cultural preservation is done or happens in different cultures and cultural identities within a unified society as a state or nation. Hence preservation of Africa's cultural heritage is capable of promoting collective consciousness in terms of unity among Africans.

Cultural heritage can be categorized into two namely: tangible and

intangible cultural heritage. 'Tangible Cultural Heritage' refers to physical artifacts produced, maintained, and transmitted intergenerational in a society. It includes artistic creations, built heritage such as buildings and monuments, and other physical or tangible products of human creativity that are invested with cultural significance in a society. 'Intangible Cultural Heritage' indicates the practices, representations, expressions, knowledge, skills as well as the instruments, objects, artifacts, and cultural spaces associated therewith that communities, groups, and in some cases, individuals recognize as part of their Cultural Heritage. Examples of intangible heritage

Tangible and intangible heritage require different approaches for preservation and safeguarding, which has been one of the main motivations driving the conception and ratification of the Convention for the Safeguarding of the Intangible Cultural Heritage. This stipulates the interdependence between intangible cultural heritage, and tangible cultural and natural heritage, and acknowledges the role of intangible cultural heritage as a source of cultural diversity and a driver of sustainable development. Recognizing the value of people for the expression and transmission of intangible cultural heritage.

Preserving cultural identity helps maintain a sense of belonging, heritage, and tradition, which can contribute to community cohesion and individual selfidentity. Preserving cultural identity is important for maintaining and enhancing facilities' performance. However, there is a need to jump into the advantage of preserving our cultural identity and traditional values, whereas we have a challenge facing us in our culture called GLOBALIZATION.

It is a defining feature of a person's identity

contributing to how they see themselves and the groups with which they identify.

Each culture has its own clothing, music, food, beliefs, and other characteristics that make it special. Record anything you've discovered through research or lived experience, no matter how small it seems. You can't write down everything there is to know about a culture—that's far too daunting! Instead, choose a smaller slice of your culture to report on. For example, you might write a

personal history of your own lived experience or that of a family member. A detailed look at a specific aspect of your culture, such as cooking, jokes, myths, specific festivals, or clothing can also be an interesting project.

You can also do the following;

Choose a medium to use for your cultural record. Use calligraphy, oral storytelling, or a traditional medium to make the recording a personal cultural experience. Or use a digital format, such as a website or DVD, to share your cultural story with people all over the world.

Explore intellectual property protection related to your medium to better protect and preserve your

cultural legacy. For example, traditional fabric or clothing patterns can be copyrighted.

Trace your family tree to discover new cultural perspectives. With the help of family members, you can go back really far into your family's history and discover whole branches of cousins and in-laws you've never met. With each new branch, you'll unlock new connections to your culture that you might never have thought about before.



Ask family for scrapbooks, journals, and other documents early on. You might discover that someone else has started working on a family tree already.

Government websites and physical record collections can offer additional information about family members going back centuries.

- ♣ Make friends with people from different departments in school and people who understand things differently from you. You'll broaden your network and they'll teach you things you never knew that you never knew. Anthony used to tell me many things about coding and tech life; I didn't understand everything but I enjoyed the conversations.
- ♣ If you want to work with someone or a company that won't hire you because you lack skills, etc., find someone in the organization, message them on LinkedIn, or email them and offer to volunteer or

do an internship. Mention the areas in which you wish to work. Use the marketing "7-3-3 rule" to follow up on messages. If you're really serious about it, follow up in 7 days if they don't respond, then send another follow-up in 3 days to remind them (if they don't respond). It's optional



to follow up a final time after 3 more days or move on.

- ♣ If you're unsure what to do career-wise, volunteer far and wide. If it doesn't help you know what you want, it'll help you know what you don't want to do and the kind of people you don't want to work with.
- ♣ YouTube is wonderful for learning things for free.
- → Join Enactus, AIESEC, and other purpose-driven associations in school. I was part of Enactus Nigeria in UNICAL and nowadays it's so sweet and easy for me to connect with any ENACTUS alumni anywhere I see them.




♣ Sometimes, don't always wait for people to walk up to you and say hello first. YOU should say hello first, too.

- Keep your CV layout simple: Black and white, no colors, text boxes, graphs, charts, pictures, borders, or columns. If you are in a creative field, add a link to your portfolio in the contact information section.
- Make use of white space for readability, with big headings, short and sharp bullet points, and key information in bold.
- 6. Mirror the job description: Read the job description carefully and tweak your CV to align with it.
- Use high-value bullet points: Focus your bullet points on achievements rather than duties. Use the STAR (Situation, Task, Action, Result) or TAR (Task, Action, Result) formats to articulate your accomplishments compellingly. Quantify your results to demonstrate your effectiveness.
- 7. Education Section: Unless your exam results are specifically requested by the employer/recruiter, you don't have to include them. I create monthly posts on emerging SEO

- techniques and social media strategies, which helps me stay at the forefront of industry trends."
- 9. File Naming: Save your document as "First Name Last Name Target Job Title". This helps hiring managers find your file easily in their system.
- 10. Keep Your CV Updated: Regularly update your CV with new achievements. Keep a personal document or create a "Result" folder to track accolades or positive feedback from colleagues. This habit ensures you are always ready with an updated resume.
- 11. Proofreading: Reread your CV multiple times and use tools like Grammarly to check for any spelling or grammatical errors.
- 12. Online Presence: Complement a well-crafted CV with a strong online presence, such as a detailed LinkedIn profile, to enhance your professional visibility.





I've achieved a good number of






recommendations and collaborations with modeling agencies.

To the young Africans in my field, my advice is "Don't give up, keep shooting, and keep creating!"










HEALTH CHALLENGES AND VACCINATION CAMPAIGN IN AFRICA

Reports show that 58.03 million people who died globally in 2005,10.9 million (18.8%) were from the WHO African Region. The majority of deaths (64%) that occurred in the Region resulted from HIV/AIDS (19%), lower respiratory infections (10%), malaria (8%), diarrhoea diseases (7%), cerebrovascular disease (4%), ischemic heart disease

(3%), tuberculosis (3%), measles (3%), low birth weight (2%), birth asphyxia and birth trauma (2%) and maternal conditions (2%).

Africa, as a region, faces several challenges as regards health care, some of them include;

> Weak leadership, inadequate legislation, limited



community participation, and resource inefficiency.

- Extreme shortages of health workers, compromising effective public health interventions.
- Corruption in medical products and technologies, unreliable supply systems, and irrational use.
- Lack of ICT and mass internet connectivity limits national health management information systems' capacity.
- There is also the poor allocation of funds to the healthcare sector, inadequate policies, and inefficient use of resources.
- Inadequate organisation and management of health services.

Getting vaccinated is an easy, secure, and reliable method of guarding against infectious diseases before you get them. It boosts your immune system and builds resistance particular to illnesses by utilising your body's inherent defences. Numerous illnesses, such cholera, COVID-19, as

diphtheria, Ebola virus disease, hepatitis B, measles, meningitis, yellow fever, and cervical cancer, are prevented by vaccination. Every year, in conjunction with World Immunisation Week (WIW) and the other WHO regions, African Vaccination Week is observed during the final week of April. It is carried out by nations under the direction and coordination of the WHO Regional Office for Africa. The AVW seeks to improve vaccination systems throughout the African Region by raising awareness of the significance of every person's (particularly every child and woman) need and right to be protected from vaccine-preventable diseases.

Debunking Myths about Vaccines

- Vaccines are not safe: Vaccines are very safe, despite implications to the contrary in many anti-vaccine publications. Most vaccine-adverse events, such as a sore arm or mild fever, are minor and temporary. These can often be controlled by taking paracetamol after vaccination.
- Vaccines cause diseases: First, no vaccine is 100% effective. To make vaccines safer than the disease, the bacteria or virus is killed or weakened (attenuated). For reasons related to the individual, not all vaccinated persons develop immunity. Most routine childhood vaccines are effective for 85% to 95% of

recipients. Second, in most high-income countries, the people who have been vaccinated vastly outnumber those who have not.

Vaccination Campaigns in Africa

1. Campaign for malaria vaccination in Africa; The World Health


Organization (WHO) and partners rolled out the routine first malaria vaccination campaign in Africa. The campaign to get children vaccinated began in Cameroon at the end of January 2024, with plans to expand access to 9 additional African countries later in 2024. More than 90% of malaria cases and deaths are in Africa, with children accounting for

the majority of deaths.

2. Campaign for COVID-19 Vaccine in Congo: The Ministry of Health of the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), the

Expanded Programme on Immunization (EPI), with the support of Africa Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (Africa CDC) and implementing partners, conducted a two-week Rapid Results Initiative (RRI) COVID-19 mass vaccination campaign in April 2023. The campaign's primary objective was to accelerate

and improve the low
vaccination rates in
DRC. A total of
304,801 individuals
were successfully
vaccinated during
this initiative. Many
campaigns
promoting COVID-19
vaccination are
spread around the
continent.




3. Cervical cancer vaccination in Nigeria; cervical cancer is the third most common cancer and the second most frequent cause of cancer deaths among women aged between 15 and 44 years Nigeria introduced the human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine into

its routine immunization system in October 2023, aiming to reach 7.7 million girls – the largest number in a single round of HPV vaccination in the African region – in a vaccination drive against the virus that causes nearly all cases of cervical cancer.

- 4. Polio Vaccination drive: This campaign was initiated to ensure vaccination of 21 million children under the age of 5. It started in May 2023, the exercise was set to begin in Cameroon, Chad, and Niger before being extended to the Central African Republic.
- 5. Vaccination against measles outbreak in South Africa: In a concerted effort to combat the outbreak of measles and bolster the ongoing measles elimination phase, the National Department of Health in South Africa, in collaboration with the World Health Organization (WHO) South Africa and other partners, concluded a measles vaccination campaign. The campaign, which ran from February 6th to April 30th, targeted children between the ages of 6 months to 15 years, aiming to achieve a coverage of at least 95%.
